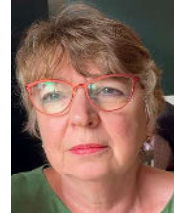

## Treasurer's Chat

I'm sitting inside listening as yet another storm batter our shores, luckily the sun is shining through the window but I can see huge wild waves breaking over the beach.



### Pro-rata subs for dual members

We have been contacted by NFWI who have brought it to our attention that we misinterpreted the information we had received. Therefore, we must retract the advice we gave last month regarding the subs for new dual/multi members. The current rule must remain, no matter when a new member joins as a dual she must pay the full WI portion.

### Subs where does our money go?

We are coming towards the end of the WI subs year, and we have been asked to explain what the Federation portion is used for.

Those of you who were at last year's AGM will know that our main expenses are the rent of the office at Pean Hill, salaries for two members of staff, insurance and utility bills as well as equipment and stationery. In addition to these basic running costs we have the obligation to support all our 100 WI groups, this includes: distribution of information and expenses incurred by WI advisors and trustees. We fulfil our charitable objectives by arranging events such as resolution meetings, craft, leisure and sports events. These are arranged by our volunteer team members who are entitled to claim legitimate travel costs.

Over recent years we have endeavoured to reduce all our expenditures; we have reduced printing and postage costs, in person meetings etc and trustees take on more administrative work.

### Lloyds Bank Update

NFWI has been working with other charities and Lloyds Bank has taken on board the federated structure of the WI. Each WI is a charitable entity without the need to be registered as a charity providing the turnover is not over £5000. NFWI will be supplying Lloyds with a complete list of all WIs banking with them and, all being well they will keep their Treasurer Account. Those WIs who have been moved to Community Accounts should be moved back to Treasurer Accounts providing they have given us the information recently requested.

Please remember a WI cannot use the charity number of the Federation or NFWI in any circumstances.

### Budgets

Treasurers will have already done, or are busy preparing, the budget for their WI. Don't worry about this, keep it simple, think about it the same way you do your household budgeting. There are fixed expenses such as hall hire and insurance. Income will vary from year to year, listen to your members and calculate income from subs based on those you expect to remain members. A budget template can be viewed or downloaded from [MyWI](#) should you wish to use it.

Remember, you must not charge members to attend meetings nor oblige them to buy raffle tickets or refreshments, we are all entitled to attend 11 free meetings a year. If money is short encourage your members to suggest free or 'cheap' meetings - see our new column further on. Fundraising can also be a good recruitment tool, why not organise a quiz night for your local community?

### Trustees Annual Report Documents

We understand that some WIs have had questions about how to complete the Trustees Annual Report .

The report form with a template of how to complete it ie what you write and where was sent out by the federation secretary on 29/10/2024 to all WI secretaries and WI presidents. The form is very straightforward. Remember all WI committee members are trustees, the officers are the President, Secretary and Treasurer.

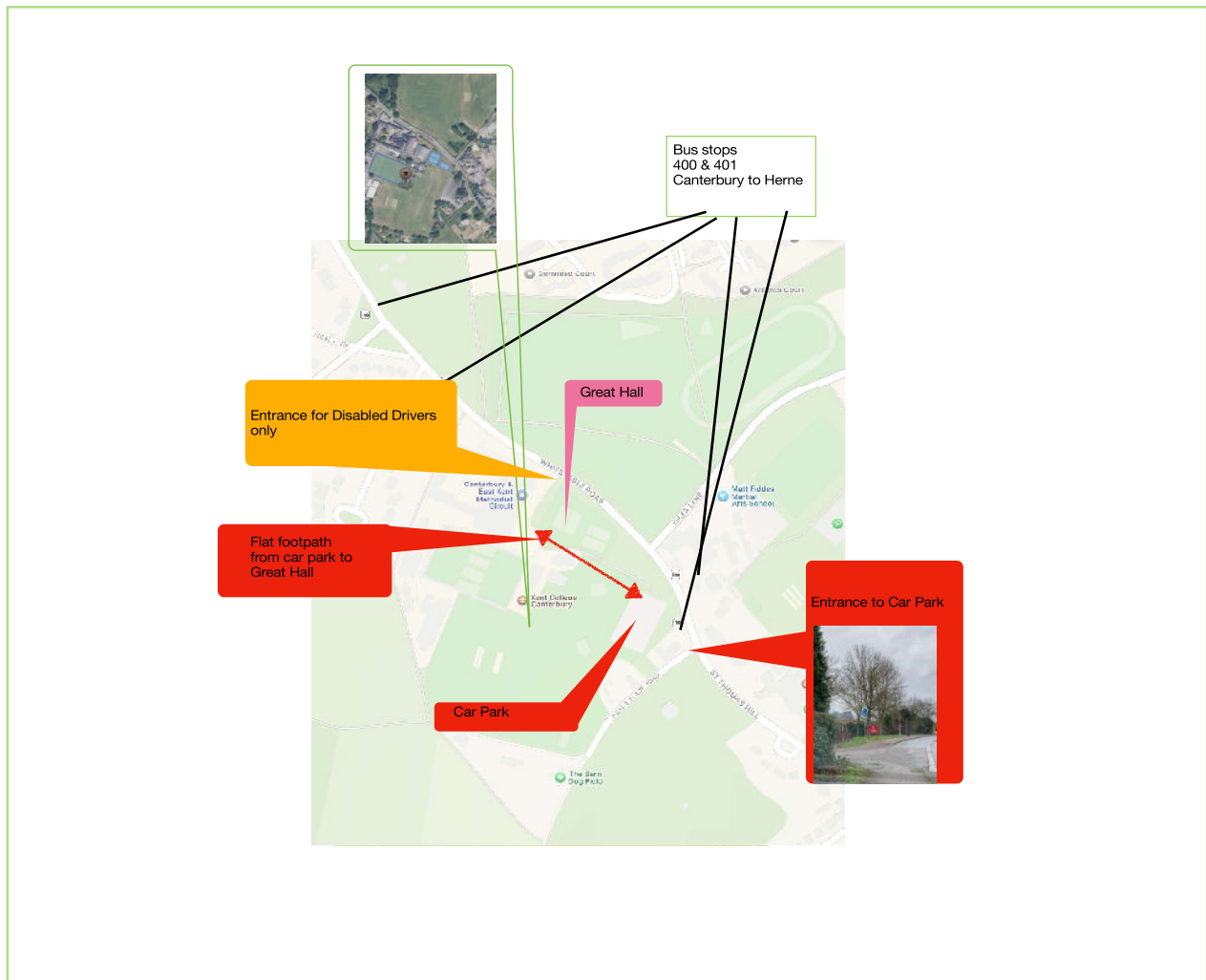

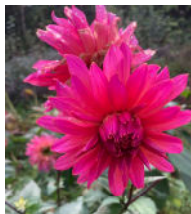

## MyWI

The MyWI pages on the NFWI website have lots of information to support members and committee members old and new. Under the tab "Running your WI" you will find lots of useful information. The WI handbook is a great source that gives lots of information about the WI and is very helpful for those thinking about joining the committee

Treasurers can download the latest version of the WI account book and financial statement.

Past copies of WI Life are available to be read online so useful if you need a craft idea or a recipe.

[MyWI](#) is for all members. Use the email address that you have given for the MCS and if you haven't been in before click on the REGISTER button. My tip - choose an easy to remember password and save it. This is one time when you don't need a very complicated password! If you have registered but have trouble logging in then first try clicking on 'forgotten my password'. You will be emailed a link where you can reset your password. If you get a message saying your email address is incorrect ask your WI MCS rep to check which email address is registered to your name. Mine is an old email address from when the MCS was first set up - this is used for platforms on the NFWI website, I use it to access the MCS, the website as web editor and MyWI, so check which address is linked to you.

Whilst researching the recycling of medication blister packs for the resolution meeting I found out all about TerraCycle. They recycle hard / impossible to recycle items and have specific programmes for :

Flash Wipes  
Babybel cheese packaging  
Cathedral cheese packs  
Gillette razors  
Crisps packets  
Marigold gloves  
Pringle pots  
Bread wax wraps  
And many more.

It is very simple to sign up as an individual or as a WI Group. You then collect the items, get a QR code or shipping label ( sent direct to your email) and send via the post. There is also an option to earn money from the process.

Why not have a look at [terracycle.com](http://terracycle.com) !

Don't forget to find out where your nearest defibrillator is using [defibfinder.uk](http://defibfinder.uk) and tell your friends and family.

The votes for the resolution selection are coming in thick and fast. The office will send the information to NFWI. Once they've collated the votes we will find out the winning resolution. As soon as we know we will let you know so you can organise your May meeting accordingly- don't forget there are lots of resources on My WI for your discussion. Bags and pickers may be available from your district or parish council, don't forget gloves for safety and a risk assessment to ensure the wellbeing of your members. Check with your local council for further requirements.

## Resolutions

The WI has a rich history of campaigning to improve our world and the future for generations to come. Keep Britain Tidy and FairTrade, are well known names that all came into being after the WI campaigned for change.

But go back further than that, and at the heart of each campaign, is a woman who looked around them and thought: 'No, things need to be done better, why don't we do something?'

The conversation starts in their own WI group and the idea grows from there. And that is exactly what happened with our current resolution: Bystanders can be Lifesavers.

At the beginning of the year we invited the Community Life Savers to our meeting where they taught members how easy it is to use a defibrillator. Our own president, Hilary Askew is one of these fab volunteers who travel to schools and clubs to teach them these skills for free.

### **But members also heard some startling truths.**

If we saw a cardiac arrest in public (different to a heart attack and much more serious), would we know what to do? Time is everything, and a swift response is crucial if the casualty is to stand a chance of survival.

Women face a poorer chance of surviving, simply because the idea of removing their bras in order to use a defibrillator is a daunting prospect that many people shy away from. Women are literally dying, due to the embarrassment of others.

Finding a defibrillator was also a concern to our members, as they started to hunt down their nearest one using [www.defibfinder.uk](http://www.defibfinder.uk)

It was interesting to find where they were situated, in schools, supermarkets, outside clubhouses and sports grounds, and in disused phoneboxes, but they are not all available all of the time. And if you delve deeper, you'll find some are not well maintained, or missing altogether. When time is important to save a life, these details matter.

When we created Bystanders can be lifesavers, it was done to tackle these issues. We wanted to fight against that feeling of helplessness you might get, should you witness someone suffer a cardiac arrest. What if it was your loved one?

There are actions that each WI can do, whether it is training, spreading the message about swift action, or just checking their local defibrillator is accessible and ready for use. If there isn't one near, why not campaign or fundraise for one in your community?

If you haven't already, we urge you to read the information on My WI about our resolution. We have already received a lot of support from local WIs which is brilliant. 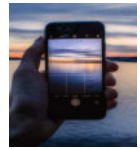
### The Joan Boucher Cup for Writing Results

## News from around the Federation

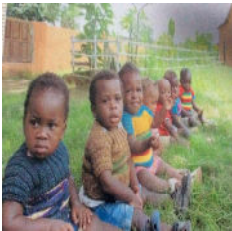
**Margate WI** makes new year request to stop litter in green spaces. Help us to tackle litter in our town for 2025, The message comes following their latest efforts at picking up litter, which was at Tivoli park on Sunday 22 December 2024, and saw them collect a staggering 25 bin bags worth of rubbish in just one hour.

Members have returned to Tivoli several times throughout the year to rid the area of litter, and on this occasion were saddened to see the higher than usual levels of rubbish blighting the community space.

President of **Upchurch WI** Helen Eldridge presented Jane Edes with her certificate and some flowers as she has been a member continuously for 30 years. Jane actually joined Upchurch WI when she was only 17 but took a break when she married and moved out of the village for a while. Jane is our Treasurer and a EKF financial examiner. Congratulations Jane !



The picture is of the fish and chip babies, in their jumpers and hats, made by various WIs and sent to Rwanda. The "fish & chip" babies were taken home wrapped in newspaper, hence name. The **Rodmersham Green** knitters have so far sent off 160 sets.



In January Barbara and Geoff Turner told **Woodchurch WI** about their visit to the National Needlework Archive. Located in the Old Chapel at Greenham Common near Newbury, it houses "The Country Wife Mural". Designed by Constance Howard in 1951 for the Festival of Britain it was constructed by her students from Goldsmiths Art College and members of the WI. The mural is a major example of 20thC textile art. The raised stump work tells a contemporary story of a village, its inhabitants, buildings and animals using 3D elements.

When the Festival of Britain closed the vast hanging (4.5mx5m) was given to Denman College where it remained until 2009. Now nearly 70 years old, once transferred to the NNA it began its conservation. The central padded figures, 5/8ths human size, depict animated women carrying out country crafts such as baking, knitting, tatting and singing. Now



housed in a huge frame its conservation is more easily accessible.

Our speakers went on to mention how the mural was represented on postcards from Denman and how in 1997 WI publications produced a 1,000 piece jigsaw of the mural. ## **Sea of Dreams by Jennifer Baker, Whitfield Evening WI**

Matthew Arnold is in my head as I stand on Dover beach. I wonder where he stood as he looked out and wrote "The sea is calm tonight"? Here was a man who knew the sea in all its moods, its history of loss and sorrow; loss and sorrow often the fault of his fellow man. The sea is also calm tonight as I look out and think of that fateful day I too knew loss and sorrow.

It was January and cold, icy cold. I had come to the beach to think. It will probably seem strange to anyone who does not live close to the sea but I have always found turning my back on my country and looking out to the rest of the world that somehow I can make some sense of the sorrow I am enduring. Mind you that is almost impossible. I thought we were happy together. Life was not perfect, he was as obstinate and occasionally as pig headed as I know I can be but somehow we ensured the good times outnumbered the bad. We cheerfully agreed we did not want a life of constant harmony. How boring we sneered. How arrogant we were.

He loved to come and watch the sea as much as I did. The calm sunny days were fine, the warmth on our faces, the occasional wispy clouds drifting above. These were days for remembering and quiet reflection. But these were not favourite days, we longed for days when wind and rain roared lashing the sea sending it crashing onto the beach causing the shingle to fly, causing the gulls to screech and soar haphazardly above. How we shouted out loud in a futile attempt to beat the noise of the wind and the bullets of rain stabbing our cheeks. How we laughed.

He loved to swim in the sea and said one day his dream would be to swim to France. I always mocked him as after ten minutes of battling the waves and losing he would drag himself onto the beach gasping and groaning like a stranded whale. I would sneer and tell him he was no Captain Webb. He always smiled when I told him that but I failed to notice the hurt in his eyes. He said he knew that what I said was true but how many dreams did come true? It was sometimes more comfort if your dreams did not succeed and stayed with you for another day. I laughed at this as well, what was the point of a dream if you knew it would never come true? I wasn't a great one for dreams; give me real life I would scoff. As usual we called a truce, or so I thought.

That winter my work took me away for a few days. After he had lifted my case into the car I hugged him and said that if he did reach Calais we could do with some lovely French cheese. He smiled but stayed silent.

He wasn't there when I came home. All trace of him was gone. I went to the beach. One of his friends was there. He said he knew nothing but I knew he was lying. I pointed to his face and laughed. He was trying without success to grow a beard. You can't help it can you he said. You have to make fun of others' dreams. Why do you think he's gone?

The wind bit my face. He was right, why do I always do that?
