She lives in Canterbury with her husband and children and enjoys writing inspiring blogs, podcasting and spending quality time with friends and family.

Keji has a particular focus on empowering women to overcome adversity. She interviewed more than sixteen guests on her social media on topics such as grief, loss, self-esteem, impostor syndrome, mental and emotional well-being, and other more relevant topics.

Keji is passionate about self-advocacy and takes a holistic approach to providing support that considers the whole person, not just their mental health needs. She is a former civil servant who has worked for the Metropolitan Police and Department for Work and Pensions. She is an active member of the community and sits on a number of Local Committees and Boards.

LINDSEY BARRELL, AKA MS CHERRY BOMBE



Essex based Lindsey has been a WI member for many years and her alter ego, Ms Cherry Bombe, has been a regular speaker on the WI circuit since 2014. FROM OUR CLIMATE AMBASSADOR

In November I gave a talk to my local branch about being a Climate Ambassador and the new NFWI campaign Fair Green Future.

The Fair Green Future will have two stages. The first is about learning and listening to explore how climate change impacts people unequally. Women and disadvantaged people often suffer more from the effects of climate change and climate policies can hit vulnerable people hardest if they are not well designed. We need to make sure that those most affected can be involved in the discussions and decision making. And part of that means dealing with all the misinformation that is around at the moment.

The second stage will use this learning to call for political change and a fair green transition for all.

NFWI have produced some excellent resources so that you can discuss the campaign within your branch.

There is a discussion guide here which includes a short explanatory video [Fair Green Future Discussion Guide](#) and a fact sheet [Fair Green Future Factsheet](#).

If you do have a discussion in your branch please let me know how you get on so I can feedback to Public Affairs.

PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION RESULTS

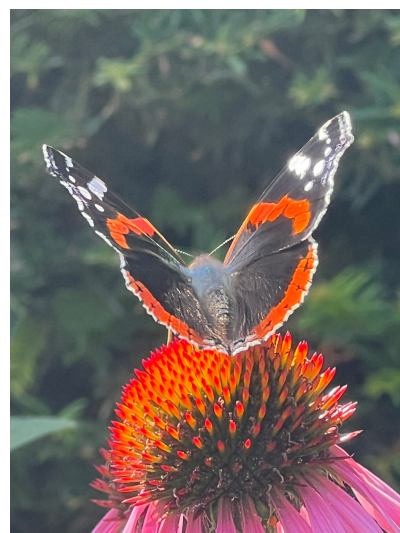

PUBLIC AFFAIRS TEAM

Violence against Women and Girls

Kent Police have been running a series of talks on Violence against Women and Girls. These are run on Microsoft Teams and are open to interested parties, EKFWDI received an invitation.

The last meeting was held on 1st December 2025 the day before the 2nd Part of the Angiolini report was published. This was well timed as the meeting was about measures being taken to protect Women and Girls in the Community. Mention of Wayne Couzens was made as he started his police career and criminal behaviour in Kent.

Kent is a large county, and a great deal of effort has been made to reduce the risk to Women and Girls in the Community. There were police present at Freshers weeks at Kent Universities to provide presence and support for students starting university being away from home and meeting lots of new people. There have been visits to schools although they emphasised that this was not to point the finger at boys but to encourage the pupils to understand what healthy relationships are.

There are also Walk and Talk sessions when groups of women go out with female police officers and it gives a chance to provide support and build rapport. Measures have also been taken to improve safety on public transport.

Kent Police are tracking the progress of these measures to see the areas where there is improvement and where there needs to be more attention.

Anyone who is involved in anything to do with Violence against Women and girls or who has an interest in this subject could ask to join these meetings

News from around the Federation

For their first meeting of 2026, **Woodchurch WI** welcomed Sue Duckworth who spoke about East Kent Folklore. Sue began with a definition of folklore - the traditional beliefs, customs, myths and stories of a community or particular place, passed down through the generations.



With a varied coastline, a variety of fishing and agricultural areas, plus a long historical and literary tradition Kentish Folklore continues to expand and develop. Traditions linked to the fishing industry are seen in the Sea Blessing at Margate and Whitstable; inland are tales and traditions linked to Hop Picking. Superstitions and stories connected witchcraft of the 16th Century are evident in Canterbury where there remains a replica ducking stool. The Holy Maid of Kent (Elizabeth Barton) being one of the more eminent supposed witches. Hoodening, more specific to East Kent and Thanet, still remains along with Wassailing, an Anglo-Saxon tradition of blessing the Apple Tree.

Newington WI kicked off the first meeting of the year in fine style with an entertaining and inspiring talk from crime novelist Linda Murphy Regan. From the outset, Linda had the room captivated with anecdotes from her colourful upbringing and her early career as an actress, sharing stories that were both warm and laugh-out-loud funny.

She spoke candidly about her journey into writing, including the setbacks she faced when her first attempts were turned down by publishers. Undeterred, Linda reinvented herself by trying a different genre, a decision that led to her successful career as an accomplished crime novelist; one of her books is now being made into a film.

Laughter and enjoyment were the clear themes of the evening, and Linda's lively personality shone throughout. The night ended with a book signing for members wishing to purchase copies, rounding off a thoroughly enjoyable and uplifting start to the WI year."
